Every year, volunteerism in the United States generates over \$100 billion in economic activity. However, volunteer hours served have been declining steadily for 20 years. Volunteerism among older adults has been comparatively resilient. As a result, the share of total volunteer hours accounted for by the 65+ population grew from 18.5% in 2002 to 28.6% in 2021 (most recent data available). This increase in share has occurred despite rising labor force participation of the older adult population and the COVID-19 pandemic.

Jean Bastien has been the singular beating heart of the Shepherd's Center of Northern Virginia for nearly 25 years, indeed, virtually since our founding in 1998. How is it that we can describe her in this way?

Well, responding to a request for a volunteer with computer skills in 1999, she began to work in the staff office where she quickly became the database manager and webmaster for the organization-roles that she has held without interruption ever since.

Jean, designing and maintaining our website, managing our volunteer and donor databases, and generally serving as a computer technical expert in the office has been critical to the success of the organization over our quarter century of service to Northern Virginia. She has been recognized by SCNOVA with our Volunteer Achievement Award and our lifetime service award (The Ed Lowry Award). She has also been recognized by the Town of Vienna for her volunteer commitment to the community. She is forever available, patient, and thoughtful. Generations of office managers and Executive Directors have relied on her unwavering support.

She has conservatively provided over 12,000 hours of volunteer work for SCNOVA, valued at nearly \$300,000. No one in our history even comes close to this level of service. Jean stands alone. I think I've said enough. Jean, a quiet and humble person, would be embarrassed if we went on with further accolades!

TOM CALLANEN

Shepherd's Center of McLean, Arlington, Falls Church, Virginia

Tom Callanen was raised in Falls Church and moved in 1975 to McLean where he and his wife Susan Snell have lived since. His career was entirely with the CIA, where he served in a variety of analytical and management positions for over 44 years. He joined Shepherd's Center of McLean, Arlington, Falls Church (SCMAFC) in May 2017 as a volunteer driver.

Since 2017, he has averaged giving 30-50 rides per year. He has served as a Ride Coordinator, newsletter editor, and management committee chair. In 2018 and 2019 he took on special projects such as organizing and conducting an extensive survey of our clients, and another to improve our driver insurance coverage. He joined the board in 2020, serving the past two years as its Chair.

Since becoming Chair, Tom has focused his time and energy on strengthening our "people." He has spent many hours talking to existing volunteers, encouraging them (with remarkable success) to step up and contribute their time as committee chairs and committee members. He typically takes the soft approach of meeting them for lunch or coffee. Then, in that or successive meetings, he learns enough about their skills and interests to suggest positions he thinks will appeal to them. His instincts are typically right on and the matches he creates are solid.

Working with others at the Center, Tom has established a more consistent regimen of recruiting new volunteers through notices in local newspapers and websites. Again, he often uses a personal approach once a potential volunteer has expressed interest to ensure that the potential volunteer becomes an actual one. In pre-Covid years, we added 28-29 new volunteers a year. Those numbers fell to 16 new volunteers added in 2021 and 19 in 2022.In 2023, 36 new volunteers have joined SCMAFC thanks to Tom's more consistent, systematic approach.

Tom is a "people person." It is important to him to know and understand the volunteers he interacts with, and to make them feel needed and appreciated.

At the same time, he has focused on the management side of the organization. He created a cloud-based file system so that board members can share documents. He has continued the tradition of asking committee chairs to submit written reports so there is documentation of our efforts. He has pursued grant opportunities with local funders to provide a strong financial base. His two-year term as Chair ended in December 2023. He has left the board considerably stronger than when he assumed its leadership.

WAYNE CHAPMAN

LifeQuest of Arkansas, Little Rock, Arkansas

Since Wayne Chapman's first LifeQuest class in 2018, he has consistently enriched our organization with his unwavering dedication and multifaceted contributions. Despite being a relatively recent addition to LifeQuest, Wayne, as a class instructor, video producer, actor and director, has made a positive impact on our people and organization, inspiring his students to share his passion for various forms of artistic expression such as music, ballet, contemporary dance, acting and theatre.

Wayne's impact extends beyond his role as an instructor; he also plays a pivotal role in the leadership of LifeQuest, serving on the Curriculum Committee (formerly known as the Adventures in Learning committee). When asked about his motivation for volunteering at LifeQuest, Wayne expressed, "The opportunity to share what I have learned about theatre, dance, and music with my peers gives me such great joy."

Hailing from Fresno, California, Wayne Chapman earned his undergraduate and master's degrees in performance of literature from the University of Arizona. He furthered his academic journey by obtaining a Ph.D. in Performance Studies from the University of Utah. While on the faculty of the University of Arkansas at Little Rock, Wayne's excellence in teaching garnered him the university's Excellence in Teaching Award. At LifeQuest, we are honored to draw from his teaching acumen along with his experience in acting and directing numerous plays for college and community theatres.

Beyond the stage, Wayne has made a mark in the world of media, creating, and directing over one hundred TV and radio commercials. In 2022, he utilized his background to produce a captivating promotional video for LifeQuest.

Wayne's teaching journey at LifeQuest commenced with a class on the Ballet Russes sparking an interest in ballet and other dance styles among LifeQuest members. Classes such as "Mind and Mindfulness," "From Country to Opera," "Embracing Poetry," and "Shakespeare Transformations" (and more!) showcase Wayne's versatility and commitment to teaching about a wide variety of artistic forms. When LifeQuest transitioned to an online-only curriculum in 2020 due to the pandemic, Wayne, equipped with media technical skills, promptly stepped-up to continue teaching by reaching LifeQuest participants online across the state.

In addition to teaching, Wayne's dedication shone brightly this past year in a project directing the play, "The Octette Bridge Club." Over nine months, Wayne and his class met frequently, delving into acting, theatre production, set design, costumes, and props. The result was a stellar performance attended by over 150 guests. Many of the play's crew, all LifeQuest members and theatre novices, trusted Wayne's vision and direction for their first-ever experience in a theatre production.

Wayne Chapman's tireless commitment, passion, and leadership have undoubtedly left an indelible mark on LifeQuest, making him a deserving candidate for the Volunteer Excellence Award. His ability to inspire, educate, and lead sets an example for the entire LifeQuest community.

LINDA DANFORD

Shepherd's Center of Greensboro, North Carolina

Upon assuming the role of Executive Director at The Shepherd Center of Greensboro, the timeline was outlined: a two-month wait before witnessing our mission and star program in action with the commencement of the Adventures in Learning semester. The initial class visited was Women in Ancient Rome, led by Linda Danford, captivating a crowd of 50 individuals in the church sanctuary with her expertise and presentation style.

Linda is a retired professor of the classics at University of North Carolina, Greensboro, and became a volunteer instructor with us 12 years ago at the request of our AlL program chair (who was also a professor at UNCG). Whether the topic is ancient architecture, arts, forms of entertainment in ancient Greece, or the lives that shaped forms of government...her students (many of whom are also retired teachers) love her and we are fortunate that Linda loves the mission and work of Shepherd's Center. In her speeches about AlL she always highlights the joys of teaching elders who are attentive, have great questions and love lifelong learning.

In 2015 she joined the Board of Directors, serving two terms with many roles (in development, goal planning, finance, leadership, cheerleading) including President for 2 years and as Past President for 2 years, during one of our greatest periods of growth and stability. She gave speeches, acted as liaison for two of our strongest church partnerships, raised funds from friends and fans, and thoroughly loved the role of leader.

One of my favorite Linda-taking-charge events happened when a long-time student of SCG classes passed and we learned that Kathryn had left a generous bequest for us in her will. In talking about how we could honor this music professor, Linda contacted the retired professional organist at the church where our classes are held, and they designed a musical performance in honor of Kathryn and invited all 180 participants to join in a performance of Kathryn's favorite pieces during our day of classes. It was grand!

Nearing the end of her second Board term, just as it was time to step off the board, she arrived in our office and told our staff and volunteers that is was time to move our offices to our homes and cancel our bus trips, spring classes, and inperson services...Covid had arrived and her doctor son had filled her in about the massive number of his hospital's patients who were seniors. Linda stood beside us as we returned fees to our participants, contacted key supporters, learned about Zoom options, and planned to shift and pivot. She helped us get through such a dire period in a nonprofit service challenge.

After a one-year Board hiatus she was invited back to the Board this year since there are many new members who need Linda's agency knowledge and history to plan for SCG progress. Linda is always there when we need her, supporting and recognizing the work done by staff and volunteers. She genuinely loves older adults and lights up their faces with her caring. She exemplifies servant leadership in her faith community, represents her love of lifelong learning, and continues to advocate for the power and purpose of elders. We are so fortunate to have her talent and support on the Shepherd Center team.

Greg Lear can easily be described as a Kansas City Shepherd's Center's "Super Volunteer," where he has been an active volunteer leader since 2004. He is an outstanding example of Shepherd's Center's mission inspired 52 years ago by our founder, Dr. Elbert Cole, of purposeful and meaningful living in retirement years, exchanging work for compensation with work in service to others.

It all started when Greg saw a posting on a bulletin board at church asking for volunteer Meals on Wheels drivers, and he's been delivering a daily well check and a hot meal to KCSC clients for nearly twenty years since. He had just retired from Medicare as a Manager and had a passion for food insecurity issues, also volunteering for Harvesters, Kansas City's main food bank. Greg also volunteered as a driver for our 'Wheels that Care' transportation program from 2012 until we transitioned the program to Jewish Family Services in 2017 where he still drives for the Jet Express program in 2024.

Greg served on the KCSC board of directors from 2006-2012 and Community Advisory Committee from 2013 to 2019. His roles in leadership on the board and advisory council, as well as his two decades of serving as a program volunteer for KCSC, have provided Greg with a broad understanding of the capacity needs of KCSC. He is always willing to step up for tasks and projects that benefit the clients we serve, even on short notice if he's in town and available.

A retired 30-year career Medicare executive, Greg has been a dedicated volunteer Medicare counselor for KCSC since 2005. Greg and our other volunteers save Medicare beneficiaries substantial out-of-pocket expenses by listening to the financial and medical needs of the clients they serve, analyzing the complex Medicare marketplace, and offering information help clients select the most cost-effective plans to meet their needs.

Greg was honored in our inaugural "70 over 70" Class of 2018 for his ongoing and multiple contributions to the mission of KCSC, as well as his community leadership in Kansas City, where he is also active in his church and in other organizations. Greg is inspiring in all regards, finding time for others and his volunteer commitments while enjoying his retirement with his wife, Nancy, including traveling and long visits to be a proud Grandpa. Greg and Nancy are ongoing and generous donors to the mission of KCSC in addition to their outstanding and long-serving volunteer contributions, both of which make fulfilling our mission possible. Greg leads enthusiastically and positively from a place of humility, servant leadership and dedication to KCSC's core values. Shepherd's Center of Kernersville, North Carolina

One of the many ministries of The Shepherd's Center of Kernersville is free pastoral counseling. We are pleased to have Tom Lee as our counselor on a weekly basis. He is a retired minister with an array of training in grief, depression, family counseling, addiction, and other needs of the human heart. Tom is a delight, easy to talk with, trustworthy, and resourceful in assisting individuals with their specific needs.

Tom first came to The Shepherd's Center of Kernersville in 1992, when our first Executive Director, Heather Camp, was seeking a volunteer counselor to aid with this need in our community. Heather reached out to Tom through his current volunteer role at Contact Winston-Salem where he counseled low-income individuals via office and telephone counseling. At the time that Heather approached Tom, he was planning to move to Greensboro and responded with, "Sure, let's give it a go."

Tom attended college at Auburn University for Industrial Management, then in his junior year he decided he needed to study something more fulfilling. He changed his major to English with a minor in Psychology after attending summer school and with deep thought, Tom started thinking about studying ministry. He then attended Duke Divinity School and completed his Bachelor of Divinity degree in 1956. He later completed a master's degree in counseling from UNC Greensboro. Within 40 years of ministry work, Tom led a number of congregations as a minister across Alabama and Western North Carolina. Tom also spent about 5 years on the Board of Ordained Ministry with the Western NC Conference.

When asking Tom what one of his most enjoyable moments were through the years, he responded with working with the Methodist Youth Camp. He stated he was able to use his skills while enjoying his time working with Camp Tekoa Youth Camp in Henderson, NC for 11 years. He felt that the kids got a lot out of the camps, he could see their growth, and felt the work he did fulfilled a purpose. This was truly his favorite experience during his career.

Tom states that he continues to volunteer because he likes to, and it gives meaning to his life and others. For Tom, the most rewarding part of counseling is when the recipients have met their desired outcome and feel they can move forward. The most challenging part about counseling for Tom is when the recipients can't quite grasp the issue they are facing and when he isn't able to help them get what they are seeking.

In 2023, Tom completed 78 counseling sessions, doubled from the year before. Tom also doubled his volunteer hours from 62 to 120 volunteer hours just last year. Tom's commitment to us has shown how extraordinary he truly is while serving these adults in need. He has been consistently, week after week, in our office offering his time and skills for 32 years. Tom is an amazing 93-year-old with such delightful stories and experiences to tell. Thank you, Tom, for all the time and effort you have given us at The Shepherd's Center of Kernersville and helping us to continue to fulfill our mission.

RANDALL OSBORNE

Mutual Adoption Pact, Shepherd's Center of Greater San Marcos, Texas

Randall's commitment to the Mutual Adoption Pact (MAP) began in 2001 when he relocated to San Marcos, Texas to begin his tenure as a professor in the Department of Psychology at Texas State University. He immediately immersed himself in MAP's intergenerational servicelearning program of matching older adults with university students in creating enduring relationships of mutual benefit.

He served as a mentor to students while identifying older adults and older adult communities that could benefit as program clients/participants. He further provided his expertise as a researcher to validate the benefit of MAP to both older adults and students.

ICentral to his findings are that MAP enhances the quality of life of older adults while increasing volunteerism by young adults and simultaneously decreasing ageism. During his journey with MAP, Randall has volunteered in directly serving the needs of older adults. He has a particular interest in working with MAP's programs addressing food insecurity, including collaboration with Meals on Wheels, the Public Housing Authority, and the Food Bank. Food distribution is of both perishable (hot) and non-perishable (canned and packaged) food items.

Randall has not limited himself to addressing the nutritional needs of older adults. He has long recognized the plight of social isolation among this population. His volunteering and mentoring have led him to seek ways to create enduring relationships between the generations. He has fostered interactions that have been consistently maintained for five years or more. He consistently seeks to enhance MAP to better address ways to reduce the boredom, helplessness, and loneliness of older adults.

His vision for MAP and the Shepherd's Center model of caregiving and lifelong learning has led him to provide leadership in a current program of expansion for the greater San Marcos area. He serves as both a board and planning committee member for this effort. He is tireless in reaching out to community organizations to join as collaborators. These include nonprofits, faith communities, governmental entities, and commercial businesses. Of particular interest is a relationship he has nurtured with a continuing education organization for older adults that has strong media ties.

Dr. Randall Osborne is a tireless steward for MAP and Shepherd's Centers. He addresses the need. He provides direct services to older adult clients, mentors young adult volunteers, validates program effectiveness through research, and provides leadership to both sustain and expand the program for the future.



Mid North Shepherd's Center, Indianapolis, Indiana

Rev. Robert A. Schilling has been working with Mid-North Shepherd' Center since 2007. His remarkable services as Choir Director and active participant have earned Bob an outstanding reputation. He sang in the Choir sixteen of the eighteen years he directed the choir, including more than two hundred performances at retirement homes, nursing homes, social clubs, churches, conventions, Indiana State Fair, adult day care centers, and a retired public employees convention (with several hundred folks in attendance). The Indianapolis Choir sang at two national conferences of Shepherd Centers of America (SCA) – Lake Junaluska and Indianapolis.

Bob recruited additional musicians for most of the performances, which included flutists, violinists, percussionists, and pianists. The repertoire included show tunes, folk songs, spirituals, patriotic songs, seasonal songs, and Broadway Show tunes. Each year he selected a Broadway Show that had available scores for choirs such as "Oklahoma," "Guys and Dolls," "Carousel", "South Pacific," and many others.

Bob also presented a number of programs over the years. These included model railroading, a hobby show of his armadillo collection, "My favorite Hymns," pipe organ construction, Thanksgiving program, travelogues, symbolism in North United Methodist Church sanctuary, and he led devotional gatherings in the chapel.

Bob turned 90 in October of 2023. He served North United Methodist Church in Indianapolis as Minister of Worship and the Arts (organist, choir director, associate pastor) for forty-one years, 1961 – 2002. He was called to service by Elbert C. Cole who later became the founder of Shepherd Centers of America.Mid-North Shepherd's Center was founded in 1982, sponsored by eight area congregations and met at North United Methodist Church. The Shepherd Singers (SATB choir) was founded in 1982 by Anna Lee Hamilton. She passed in 2005 shortly after issuing the CD recording "Hymns We Love to Sing." Bob was then invited to become the volunteer director of the Shepherd Singers in March 2005 and continued until directing his final concert in October 2023, a total of 18 years.

Bob has retired from conducting the choir, but he still attends, and enjoys singing in the bass section. Rev. Schilling's profound enthusiasm for the mission of living with meaning and purpose distinguishes him as an exemplary model volunteer.

There are so many reasons why Chuck Smithers is an outstanding volunteer. The number one reason is that Chuck is a genuinely caring and altruistic individual who gives of his time, treasure, and talents without any strings attached. Chuck has been the treasurer for Shepherd's Center of Orange Park (SCOOP) since 2015, at least that is his official title. What Chuck actually does is much more complicated; he is a confidant, advisor, mentor, worker bee, donor, volunteer, and a talented CPA. Two words used to describe Chuck are consistency and commitment.

Chuck spends on average 4½ hours a week working on deposits, reports, budgets, and 990's for SCOOP. In 2023, he spent 234 hours of accounting work, at a value of \$9,126. Over the past 8 years the value of his work has been \$70,008. In addition to the bookkeeping work, Chuck keeps the board abreast of any changes in laws that could affect our ability to provide services to the community. Everyone on the board values how he breaks down financial reports for lay leaders to understand.

Chuck is very conscious of the changing landscape of fundraising for the Shepherd's Center. SCOOP's typical funders have faced increased demands from corporate heads and government, making it more difficult for them to financially assist smaller nonprofits in the community through sponsorships. As SCOOP saw many funders go by the wayside, Chuck stepped up and shared his treasure at the Platinum Sponsor Level (+\$2,500) for our Golden Years Gala in 2022 - 2024.

Chuck has successfully guided SCOOP through the pandemic and post-pandemic challenges of fundraising. During this time, SCOOP saw a 20% decrease in revenue, probably a treasurer's worst nightmare! Chuck has worked tirelessly in finding other funding sources: he wrote a grant for ARPA funding from Clay County government, assisted with a technology grant from The Community Foundation, and participated in funding opportunities from the Reinhold Foundation.

In addition to his treasurer duties, Chuck has spent many hours in educational courses. Chuck participated in Diversity, Equity and Inclusion training offered by Shepherd's Center of America. Chuck has used this training to help guide our board in adopting a DEI statement. Chuck has followed up this training by participating in monthly meetings to assess the progress of our organization and hear best practices from other Shepherd's Center organizations.

Beyond his accounting gift, Chuck is always ready to help in other ways: setting up outreach booths, organizing auction items at the gala, and our all around fix it/IT guy in the office. In addition to serving Shepherd's Center of Orange Park, Chuck serves on the Board of Shepherd's Center of America in the capacity of treasurer. Sarah Cheney, Executive Director of SCA echoes our feelings, "He comes to every meeting prepared to discuss all topics on the agenda. Chuck is a wonderful collaborator who brings people together. He is good at finding common ground and moving discussions forward."

Chuck is not only an unsung hero for SCOOP, but he also serves on multiple boards throughout Clay County: The Clothes Closet and Food Pantry of Orange Park (Chairperson of the Board) and Anointed Communities in Transformation (Treasurer and Board Member). Chuck is also highly active in his church, Buckman Bridge Unitarian Universalist Church (President of the Board).

Chuck does all this work without any request for accolades. He is the type of board member that all executive directors would like to clone. He is always available to give advice and find answers to any number of board issues.

If we had to hire an individual to provide similar services to SCOOP, it would add another 10% to our budget. Chuck's dedication to SCOOP and to older adults in Clay County cannot be measured. He is making a difference, he is enhancing our community, and he sets an example of volunteerism!



Home Inspector, Builder, Psychology Professor, Licensed Professional Counselor, Air Force Electronics Specialist, Entrepreneur—all these titles have described John Woodmansee at various points in his life. In 2012, John walked into the Shepherd's Center of Greater Winston-Salem to inquire about volunteer opportunities. He would soon add Home Repair Volunteer to his long list of titles.

He was winding things down with his 30-year home inspection business and was exploring ways to serve his community. He expressed a particular passion for helping older adults with challenging home repair needs.

It would take another three years for him to fully make the transition from his business, but in 2015 at age 84, he joined the home repair team of the Shepherd's Center and has not slowed down since. Over the past nine years, John has responded to close to 2000 home repair needs and also served as mentor, professional advisor, and source of inspiration for a team of twenty or so repair volunteers. He approaches his volunteer role just as he would a real job, putting in several hours each day repairing leaky faucets, fixing malfunctioning toilets, installing grab bars, and addressing any number of things that can break or go wrong in a house. Now at 92, he continues to work circles around other volunteers half his age, crawling under sinks and doing whatever the job requires. John's story exemplifies the Shepherd's Center vision of what it means to age well and find meaning and purpose in serving others.

While John's repair skills are remarkable, his care for people is just as extraordinary. He always takes time to get to know homeowners, often engaging them in the repair process. He sees his role as "working with" as opposed to "doing for," always treating those who invite him in their home with respect and dignity.

In addition to his tireless involvement with the Shepherd's Center, John finds time to sing in his church choir and attend symphony concerts. During tax season, his repair work takes a back seat as he volunteers to assist older adults with tax preparation. A few years ago, he spent several months helping to renovate old apartments which were being converted to housing for people transitioning from homelessness. He continues to have a special interest in psychology and recently helped start a men's group at his church.

From its inception, the Shepherd's Center has been a place where older adults are encouraged to see their lives as rich sources of wisdom and experience and to find ways to experience meaning and purpose in their post-retirement years. In our community, "Mr. John," as he is lovingly known by many who have been on the receiving end of his kindness and his incredible fix-it knowledge and expertise, continues to inspire young and old alike. Every day, John is living proof that aging doesn't have to be a stage of life to dread. It can be a rich time for learning, growing, and giving back.





Sue's impact extended beyond the Shepherd's Center; she spearheaded a grassroots campaign for a planned retirement community in the Greenbrier Valley, dedicating countless hours to the cause. Despite her passing in July 2023 from a rare brain tumor, Sue's legacy of visionary, inclusive, and enthusiastic volunteer service lives on in our community.

Sue's profound care for Shepherd's Center and her community, coupled with her compassionate leadership, has left an indelible mark. Her vision, initiative, and hard work have brought pride to her Shepherd's Center and her community.



The Gala's success continued in subsequent years, further elevating SCNOVA's profile.

Tom's personal commitment, boundless energy, and organizational prowess inspired SCNOVA's staff, volunteers, and board members alike. Through his example, he fostered collaborative and enthusiastic efforts towards SCNOVA's mission of improving quality of life for aging individuals. Tom's dedication touched every aspect of SCNOVA's vision: A World Without Loneliness. Though he is no longer with us, his impact on SCNOVA and the community lives on.



Jayne's journey with the Shepherd's Center of Northern Virginia (SCNOVA) began when a close friend of hers, who happened to be the executive director at the time, invited her to serve on the Development Committee in 2010. Recognizing Jayne's rich background in fundraising and event planning, her friend enlisted her help. Shortly after, when the office administrator decided to retire, Jayne was offered the role.

In this new capacity, she managed a myriad of tasks, from reconciling statements to being the editor of the bimonthly newsletter and interacting directly with all the volunteers.

Some of Jayne's most memorable accomplishments with SCNOVA include the successful introduction of software, which significantly streamlined the coordination between volunteers and those needing rides, making the process more efficient. Over time, Jayne's responsibilities grew, and she was named Director of Operations and Events. During the COVID pandemic, she stepped up as the interim executive director when their then-director left unexpectedly. Under her leadership, the affiliate not only remained operational throughout the pandemic but also expanded its services to provide food shopping, prescription pickups, and a host of virtual events to keep their community engaged. Jayne also played an instrumental role in merging with another local Shepherd's Center, leading to a name change to Shepherd's Centers of Northern Virginia (from Shepherd's Center of Oakton-Vienna) to better represent their broadened service area.

After a fulfilling seven years, Jayne stepped down in 2017. However, her dedication to the Shepherd's Center was far from over. The following year, she joined the SCNOVA Board of Directors, where she now holds the position of vice chair and volunteers for various committees.

Jayne's commitment to the Shepherd's Center mission extends beyond Virginia. She serves on SCA's Fundraising and Development Committee, helping to further the reach and engage more older adults.

Throughout Jayne's tenure, she has shown grace in meeting the needs of older adults while building bridges with supporting congregations, local businesses, regional politicians, and other nonprofits in the area. She clearly embodies the characteristics of servant leadership, traits such as kindness, open-mindedness, accountability, appreciation, and advocacy. Through her actions, she has enriched the lives of others, helped build a better Shepherd's Center, and created a more caring world.

When asked about how she manages to volunteer so extensively, Jayne simply remarked that she enjoys staying busy. Reflecting on her recognition with the organization's National Volunteer Leadership Award, she was initially taken aback but deeply honored.
